



2020 activity report UNESCO Chair Global Health & Education

This report covers the period January - December 2020

UNESCO Chair description

On 10 October 2018 a consortium of 60 universities lead by University of Clermont Auvergne launched the UNESCO Chair Global Health & Education. Our vision is to create the conditions for children and young people to take charge of their lives and develop as individuals, as members of their community and as global citizens for all matters related to health.

Health and education are inalienable rights for children. Improving their health and wellbeing and reducing health inequalities are a joint responsibility. Education has a key role, since people's health depends for 80% on environmental factors and lifestyle. Now is the time to create new synergies in order to improve children and young people's health. The UNESCO Chair and WHO Collaborating Centre "Global Health & Education" aim to promote intersectoral policies and practices.

The Chair encourages a strategy of social change by introducing an innovative way of practicing health promotion, prevention and health education. It combines the knowledge of health determinants with social-cultural practices. This leads to a balanced approach between environmental changes and capacity building.

The UNESCO Chair operates as an open community. Organizations and people from different backgrounds, countries, cultures with a common interest in health & education, are actively involved in different activities at a global level. Community members range from individuals (academics, students, administrators, practitioners, consultants and others) to universities and organisations (cities, regions, NGO's, unions, public and private companies and networks).

This report describes the main activities of the UNESCO Chair located at University Clermont Auvergne for 2020.

Obviously the COVID pandemic had an impact on the 2020 workplan of the UNESCO Chair. This resulted in a reduction of attending conferences and organizing 'live' events, and to the creation of the Global Health & Education webinar series, a survey on COVID-19 and the reopening of schools and the research initiative of school preparedness on future outbreaks and disasters, in cooperation with WHO/Europe.

Management and governance of the UNESCO Chair community

UNESCO Chair Secretariat

The UNESCO Chair receives core funding from MGEN and Groupe VYV. The UNESCO Chair Secretariat (Chair manager, Chair holder, project officers) together with the operational team located at University Clermont Auvergne (academics involved in the chair management), is responsible for carrying out the 4-year workplan (2018-2022). MGEN Foundation is hosting the UNESCO Chair Secretariat and is providing office space in Paris which is also available for UNESCO Chair partners. By the end of 2020



the Secretariat team consisted of 4 staff members: Didier Jourdan (Chair holder), Goof Buijs (Chair manager), Valerie Ivassenko and Silvia de Ruiter (project officers) and 2 free-lance staff members (Nicola Gray and Cecile Martinez).

The UNESCO Chair secretariat had monthly live and online meetings.

Regular meetings with the staff of the MGEN Foundation and UCA foundation took place about administrative and financial issues.

In 2020 three updates were sent to all members of the Steering Committee and the Scientific & Ethical Committee.

Core activities

1. Building the global UNITWIN community

Global mapping

In March 2020 the Working Group on Global Mapping had its first meeting. The working group is led by UNESCO Chair secretariat with a team of international partners, including Daniel Torrano (Nazarbayev University, Kazakhstan), Carole Faucher (Edinburgh University, Scotland), Bill-Potts Datema (national representative USA), Marie-Claude Lamarre (consultant, France), Marie-Pierre Sauvant-Rochat (Université Clermont Auvergne, France) and Kathelijne Bessems (Maastricht University, Netherlands). The workplan 2020-2022 has the following objectives:

- a. Identify researchers/academics, universities and institutes working in the field of school health promotion around the world. They will act as entry point to identify all local and national actors that produce knowledge in the field.
- b. Carry out a state of the art on health promoting practices for children and adolescents in countries and regions among researchers that are identified in the mapping process.



c. Redefine health determinants with a stronger focus on sustainable development and how to put these into practice.

In 2020 a bibliometric review on school health was carried out by Camille Lasalle (intern Maastricht University, supported by Nazarbayev University and UCA), which will be the basis for a scientific article in a peer-reviewed journal in 2021. The bibliometric review was the first step in identifying researchers/academics, universities and institutes working in the field of school health promotion around the world.

National representatives

By the end of 2020 the UNESCO Chair has national representatives/contact persons in 30 countries, representing 5 continents. In November a meeting was held with all of them to identify their needs and how they see their role in the UNESCO Chair and UNITWIN network in the future. The outcome is a strategic plan for national representatives and community building, early 2021. Three national representatives and members of the Chair community made a video to explain what being a community member means to them and what their expectations are, available on the Chair's website.

UNITWIN network application

In April 2020 we submitted the UNITWIN network application 'Health and Education: Innovating for Sustainable Development; Human rights, citizenship and the common good'. The thematic area of this UNITWIN network is innovation for sustainable development and the common good in the health and education sectors. Its emancipatory and ethical aim constitutes its unity. The application was submitted together with the UNESCO Chair in Sexual Health and Human Rights, University of Paris, France. In total 8 other UNESCO Chairs with related areas of work and 37 partners from all continents formally support the application. Acceptance of the application by UNESCO Head Quarters is expected early 2021. From 2021 the community building activities of the UNESCO Chair will focus on the UNITWIN network.

2. Producing knowledge

Global handbook on health promotion research

The aim of the global handbook for health promotion research is to contribute to structuring the field of health promotion research. Based on original contributions from researchers in the field, it explores the major theoretical, methodological, empirical and political challenges and pressing social questions facing health promotion research. A call for contributions was sent in April 2020. The number of contributions (almost 80 from researchers from all over the world) is way beyond our expectations. A contract has been signed with Springer for the publication of the book. It will be launched at the 2022 IUHPE world conference.

French handbook on health promotion, health education and prevention

The French handbook aims to bring together the perspectives of different practitioners in health promotion intervention, research, training and strategy. Contributions for the handbook (work title 'Réinterroger et approfondir les fondements épistémologiques et éthiques de la promotion de la santé') that will be published in 2021, are now in the process of reviewing.



Survey COVID and reopening of schools

The COVID-19 situation impacted the activities of the UNESCO Chair. In May 2020 we initiated a global survey on COVID-19 and the reopening of schools, in collaboration with key partners, including the SHE Network Foundation. An article for Health Education Journal is being reviewed and will be published early 2021. Preliminary results can be accessed on the UNESCO Chair website: https://unescochair-ghe.org/resources/themes-covid-19/preview-survey-school-reopening/. The second phase of the survey has been launched in December 2020.

French book on COVID and reopening of schools

During the second half of 2020 the French book 'Ecoles et crises sanitaires relecture' on COVID and reopening of schools was written and will be published in January 2021. An English version of the book is in preparation for 2021.

Research initiative on helping schools to prepare for future epidemics and health crises

In collaboration with WHO/Europe a research initiative was developed on 'school preparedness for future epidemics and health crises'. Together with WHO and key partners we are looking for funding to start the initiative in 2021 that will result in a concept note for future research and 2 policy briefs.

3. Building capacity

Chair Academy 2020

The Chair Academy was scheduled 7-8 April 2020, but had to be cancelled. In collaboration with the EUPHA Health Promotion section a new Chair Academy is planned for September 2021.

Summer school 2020

The UNESCO Chair Summer school was postponed to 2021 and will be organised with the EHESP School of Public Health, University of Rennes, France (Eric Breton).

Capacity Development Programme for Actors in West Africa

The UNESCO Chair initiated this capacity building programme to meet the need for trained and skilled professionals in prevention and health promotion in West Africa, especially in rural areas. In collaboration with Cheikh Anta Diop University in Dakar, Senegal. The degree "licence professionnelle en promotion de la santé" will be launched in autumn 2021.

MOOC

In 2020 the UNESCO Chair contributed to the French MOOC on Rights, Sex & Education ('Lier la santé sexuelle aux droits humains') from the UNESCO Chair on Sexual Education and Human Rights.

Preparations started for developing an international MOOC in 2021, in collaboration with the UNESCO Chair on Sexual Education and Human Rights.



4. Communicating and sharing knowledge

Global Health & Education webinar series



The UNESCO Chair and WHO Collaborating Centre Global Health & Education have taken the initiative for the *Global Health & Education webinar series*, in close cooperation with key partners. It will help knowledge sharing and capacity building on health promotion for children and young people. In 2020 in total 12 GHE webinars were organised: 7 French webinars, 3 English webinars, 1 Spanish webinar and 1 Farsi webinar.

Both the English and French website were regularly updated, including dedicated webpages for each webinar and a webpages containing links to relevant resources about COVID-19. The English website, unescochair-ghe.org, had 37.262 unique visitors in 2020 and 209.533 visits.

Youtube channel

The <u>Youtube channel</u> of the UNESCO Chair gathers all the videos of the webinars and events (seminars, conferences, workshops) organised or co-organised by the UNESCO Chair. It has a growing audience and currently has 172 subscribers. Some videos are widely watched and downloaded: the video of the 3 December 2020 webinar has 1100 views.

Project in New Caledonia

The programme "Réussir, être bien, être ensemble" (Succeed, be well, be together) was launched in New Caledonia: a two years co-design process including a professional development program, involving 40 schools from 3 provinces. In order to support teachers and families during the COVID period, when children learn differently, resources developed in 2019 are now made available in French on its website.

Work for CRES PACA

A process of knowledge transfer has been launched with the CRES PACA. It aims at producing a report on the way in which schools can influence health inequalities and factsheets for different stakeholders.

Work for the canton de Vaud et Lausanne

The Chair is involved in a research and development process at the community level. This project is lead by AVASAD (Association vaudoise d'aide et de soins à domicile).

Work with the city of Moulins and Ville-Santé-hôpital project

The city of Moulins (France) is a partner of the Chair. The work is linked to their local health contract and their town-hospital-health project (projet Ville-Santé-Hôpital). This partnership enables the Chair to contribute to the implementation of health promotion projects at a community level.



Work with URPS AURA dentists

This project with URPS AURA (regional union for private practitioners health professionals in Auvergne-Rhone-Alpes region) consists of the co-creation, development and deployment of health education tools targeting oral health in schools in the city of Clermont-Ferrand. This project implements intersectoral work between oral health professionals and school nurses at the local level.
